

Thank you for your help in protecting the youth of America.



### CAMP INCIDENT SATURDAY, JULY 19, 1986

- \* 6:00 A.M., Saturday Kyle Kuhn, Program Director, was awakened by of Troop 117 in residence (quarters shared with Camp Director).
- \* The Scout reported to Kyle Kuhn that a younger Scout from Troop 117 had been molested by one of the adult leaders staying with the Troop.
- \* Camp Director, Heegard, was awakened asked Program Director who was also SM of Troop 117 to return to the campsite and awaken the Rev. Brubaker (who was also an Asst. Adult Leader of Troop, ASM and Executive Officer of sponsor).
- \* Heegard asked Kyle to meet with the 10½ year old Scout to establish in their minds, whether an incident had occurred and if it was positive, then to confront the adult leader (James Kunkel), 39 year old Asst. SM of Troop 117.
- \* Heegard also instructed Kyle to bring the accused leader to Headquarters to meet with the Camp Director if the incident had occurred. Kyle and Pastor reported back to the Camp Director after having met with the Scout and also had confronted Mr. Kunkel.
- \* Both the Pastor and Kyle Kuhn were positive that the boy had been molested and Jim Kunkel's response when confronted with the question "What happened?" was "I'd rather not say but what the boy told you is probably true".
- A statement to this effect was typed up by Rev. Brubaker and presented to Jim Kunkel who refused to sign it. A second statement was added to this that the Pastor and Kyle had heard the aforementioned statement and both signed the paper. This was shown to Mr. Kunkel who had no response. Camp Director, Heegard, instructed Kyle Kuhn to pack up the leader and have him leave camp. While the rest of the camp went to breakfast, this was accomplished. Immediately following breakfast, Kuhn and Heegard placed a call to the parents of the Scout involved and they indicated that they would come to camp immediately. Calls were also made to the Scout Executive, Richard Bennett, and Council President, Joseph Boyd. Then a call was placed to the Avondale Barracks of the PA State Police. Two plain-clothes detectives of the State Police came into camp and conducted their investigation, interviewing the following: Parents of the Scout and the Scout who was molested, adult leaders of the Troop, Ernest Heegard (Camp Director), and Kyle Kuhn (Program Director and SM).
- \* The parents are pressing charges and the preliminary hearing is set for August 6, 1986.

### Teacher assaulted him, says Boy Scout

A Coatesville school teacher has been charged by the state police with sexually assaulting a boy last month during a Boy Scout camping trip at Camp Horseshoe, according to district court records. --

James Allen Kunkel, 1950f Honey Brook is facing charges of involuntary deviate sexual intercourse, indecent assault and corruption of minors in connection with the July 19 incident in Nottingham Township.

KUNKEL IS FREE on \$1 bail awaiting his Aug. 6 preliminary hearing before District Justice Donald C. Brown of Oxford. A hearing was scheduled for Wednesday, but defense attorney Alan P. Novak of Coatesville asked to have it delayed for a week.

Yesterday Novak declined to comment on the case. Law enforcement agencies aren't releasing any information concerning the two boy scouts involved in the case.

According to an affidavit filed in Brown's office by the state police at Avondale, the victim said he was sleeping in the assistant scoutmaster's tent with Kunkel because he was afraid of thunderstorms. At 4 a.m. the boy said he was awakened by Kunkel sexually assaulting him, the affidavit said.

Another scout was interviewed by the state police and he said the victim complained to him about the assault later in the morning, according to the affidavit. "Dozer (Kunkel) had been messing with him," the second boy reportedly told police.

KUNKEL IS A teacher at Gordon Junior High School, Coatesville, according to school district employees.

Dr. Henry Hoerner, superintendent of the school district, said he was aware of the charges and was awaiting a report from the state police.

"We have not had an opportunity to discuss it with the employee and we have no idea whether the person is innocent or guilty and that is something that has to be determined by an agency other than ours. The matter has been referred to counsel." Hoerner said.

The school district hasn't taken any formal action against Kunkel, according to Hoerner. Hoerner said he expects to have "something cleared up by September," the beginning of school.

area, said Tuesday morning he had no knowledge of anyone named Kunkle connected with the Honey Brook scouts.

Evans said he was with the cub scout pack in Honey Brook as recently as February when his son advanced from the Webelos to the Boy Scouts. He said he had been involved in scouting in the Honey Brook area for seven years, and during that time no one nomed Kunkle was with Fack or Iroop 9.

Evans said, however, that a scout group from the Glenmoore area is sometimes

A man who answered a telephone call Tuesday morning to a Honey Brook area number listed to a James Kunkle, confirmed he was James Kunkle and that he was an assistant scoutmaster. The man denied any knowledge or the arrest, however before hanging up the receiver.

Heegard said the atleged incident was the first of its kind in Camp Horseshoe's 58 year history. He said about 2,500 youth attend camp -- most of them for one week programs -- during a summer. The huge camp sprawls into two the sprawls into two and three counties, Chester, Lancaster and Cecil County, Md.

Kunkle, who was arraigned before District Justice Donald Brown in Oxford, is free on nominal bail (\$1).

Brown said a bail agency suggests what bail should be set at, based on a person's past track record, and an assumption on the judge's part that the person will appear for the preliminary hearing.
